Parent Support Group:

We are offering a parent education course, divided into 3 segments. January : Sensory Processing Disorder; February: ABC of Behavior (Antecedent, Behavior, Consequence); and March: Developing as Sensory Diet. The program is limited to 15 parents. It is offered the 2nd Tuesday or Wednesday night each month. \$25 for each course. Call the office for more details and to register.

Inclement Weather

Holiday Gift Ideas

Parents often ask for ideas for gifts for the holidays. Here are some suggestions:

Old fashion toys can always be fun and provide basic skill development. Blocks, puzzles, crayons, coloring books, craft projects, board games, memory, and card games, play and tools, pounding toys, paper dolls, and more. Look at what skills the toy will develop. Remember that at a young age motor development is important.

Gross Motor Suggestions:

Toys such as crawl tunnels, vibrating bugs, romper stompers, bungee jumper, sled, 24" ball, trampoline, rocking chair, climbing gym, tumble mats, hop scotch, "Hyper-Dash", Twister, etc.

Fine Motor Suggestions:

Finger paints, modeling clay, sewing cards, craft kits, legos, vibrating pen, paper mache, easel, tiddley winks, popheads, tic-tac-toe, and more. Remember back to what you liked as a child. Computer games may not teach some of the basic motor skills.

Vibrating toys may also be a great toy idea. Vibration can be calming for many kids. Vibrating pens, massagers, teething toys can all help organize a child.

Indoor Play

- *Obstacle Courses:* Use chairs, tables, pillows, boxes or anything to create a path. Send your child over, under and through the different obstacles. Jumping off steps, crawling on their bellows under a chair, jumping over a pillow, or being squished between pillows. Most important is to be creative and have fun.

Crafts:

- design their own wrapping paper (this can be a great messy play activity)
- placemats or cards for large family dinners

The New Year

Plan a special celebration. Make confetti by shredding paper, make special hats and special snacks. What do you remember special of the last year and how should we keep it special: pictures, album, song, etc. Goals for the New Year as a To-Do List. Exercise, charity work, clean cupboards, special games together, ways to show each other how we love them.



Outdoor Play

Snow Walks:

Identifying animal tracks can be a great time to educate kids and a great time for creative play. Have your child tell you what they know about the animal, have them imitate how that animal moves, or the noise the animal makes.

Creating snow angels is a great time for some heavy work.

Snowballs:

Instead of snowball fights have your child try to knock cans off a railing with snowballs.

Snow Creatures:

Set a goal for what you will build. Do you want it to be realistic or mystical? Ask your child what they want the head to look like. Should it have two legs or four? Should it have a long tail with spikes or a short tail? Use food coloring and water in squirt bottles to decorate the creature to add more color.
